# Harvest Pilgrimage 2020



for use on a local walk or in your garden, on your own, or in company.

If you are going for a walk – take a bag with you to pick blackberries or other hedgerow berries/fruits. Collect fruits, nuts, conkers as you go. If you are in a garden, pick some flowers/fruit/veg, whatever is available, or if not create a table display with fruit and veg etc that you have bought. If you are walking, walk for a while then...

## 1. Find a suitable place to sit or stand with a view. Take it all in. Breathe in the fresh air. Become aware of the sights, smells and sounds of the natural world.

Creator God, for daily bread and all who work to bring your harvest home, especially our local farming community we bring our thanks today.

(pause)

Forgive our ingratitude we who have so much yet waste what you have given.

(pause)

For those whose harvest is poor, whose crops have withered, water tainted, children starve, help those who bring relief and bestow on us an unaccustomed generosity, that all might share from your garden and all might sing your praise.

(pause)

Creator God, provider of all we bring our thanks today. And we bless each other that the beauty of this world and the love that created it might be expressed though our lives and be a blessing to others now and always.

2. Find another stopping place. Read the Psalm & make your response in silence or prayer.

# Psalm 65:9-13

You care for the land and water it; you enrich it abundantly.

The streams of God are filled with water to provide the people with corn, for so you have ordained it.

You crown the year with your bounty, and your carts overflow with abundance.

3. Find a quiet place to sit or stand. Observe nature around you and spend some time in quiet wonder before using this prayer:

God of bumble bees and blue whales evolution and environment ice-field and star-field:

This harvest time

may we both praise and pray

praise you for the sheer wonder of the world

and pray that this harvest is not about our wealth

but the wealth of our generosity.

As you move on from this place, you might like to hum or sing 'We plough the fields and scatter' or similar, as you go.....

4. Find a gate or crossing place. Look at the view behind you and in front of you. Spend some time thinking or chatting about the landscape of your own life/lives, especially in this last year.

Harvest of memories As farmers view their crops, weigh up the growth and likely yield, so in this quiet place my mind seeks patterns in the landscape of my life.

Growth at times has come both strong and fruitful; else when the harvest time has brought a sparse return of small and bitter grains. Plentiful and lush, dry and meagre the years have passed until once more I pause to sing of 'All good gifts around ...'
