#### Dear Friends,

In these dark winter days, when the weather is often gloomy and so cold, and the state of our country and the wider world seems so depressing, where do we find light and hope to sustain us?

Words, someone said, are signposts, they point to something but are not the thing itself. Like a finger pointing to the moon. The finger is the signpost but not the moon. There are certain words and lines from Christmas Carols that always particularly speak to me and point me to the nature and ways of God. I wonder if you can recognise the carols these words come from or spot them when you sing them this Christmas?

For a start 'Yet with the woes of sin and strife the world has suffered long; beneath the angelstrain have rolled two thousand years of wrong; and warring humankind hears not the love-song which they bring'.

These words remind me that the world has never been an easy place to live – yet easier for some people than others. But humanity still makes a mess of things – back then it was the Roman Empire against others, now it's Jews against Palestinians as well as Russians against Ukrainians and other wars like Sudan against South Sudan.

But for all the 'darkness' then and now, the good news of Christmas, is that the 'Light Of Light', 'Mary's Son came long ago to love us'. The revelation of God in the face of Jesus is a glorious stream of life-giving light that can lift our spirits and warm our hearts and minds in the dark places of our lives as we sing 'yet in the dark streets shineth the everlasting light. The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.' No matter how bleak things are the Light of Christ shines on. We were never promised an easy ride – it was into a dark and dangerous world that Jesus was born but to 'meek souls who will receive him still the dear Christ enters in' so that 'Light and

*life to all he brings risen with healing in his wings*' can be ours.

All the noise, glitz and busyness at this time of year can be such a distraction that we miss Him because He is to be found in a stable and *'with the poor and mean and lowly lived on earth our saviour holy'*; born in a far off land two thousand years ago, yet He continues to touch people's hearts and minds so gently yet powerfully for *'how silently, how silently, the wond'rous gift is given'.* 



As is always the case, Christmas will be difficult for some people as they are aware of those no longer present; for others a joyful reunion with family and friends; whatever our situation Jesus shows us that God cares, *'and he feeleth for our sadness and he shareth in our gladness'.* 

This is a time especially for generosity towards those less fortunate than ourselves. We do well to acknowledge that for all our human failings, humanity can be wonderfully kind and thoughtful without realising that *'Ye who now will bless the poor, shall yourselves find blessing'.* 

There is a line from one carol that always makes me chuckle and I doubt if I am alone in thinking 'you must be joking' when I sing, *'Christian children all must be mild, obedient, good as he'.* 

There are lots of understandable reasons why people don't regularly come to church but when at Christmas they do, I hope that they find a sincere and warm welcome. For as the angel proclaimed the 'glad tidings of great joy I bring are for you and all humankind' and the goodwill of God is 'from heaven to all'.

Life may seem somewhat bleak (that's a clue) at present but it would be unthinkable without Jesus who gave his life freely out of love for us unconditionally but hopefully so that we may respond, *'yet what I can I give Him; give my heart'.*



## Sunday Breakfast South Wraxall



Christ Church's first joint event with Dementia Action Alliance was a huge success, with over 40 people of all ages coming together to make Christmas cards, sing carols and chat. As part of the National Lottery Heritage Funded Discover Christ Church! programme of events, our Christmas cards designs were inspired by our newly restored clock and the stencilled stars on the walls of the church. The first week of December saw the completion of the restoration of Christ Church Bradford on Avon's landmark spire. Standing at the highest point in town, and towering above Christ Church primary school next door, the spire can be seen for miles around.

21 year old stonemason Ethan of Wiltshire Stonemasons and a former Christ Church Primary and St Laurence Secondary school student, has carved a the intricately decorated stone that crowns the south west pinnacle - the original having succumbed to the ravages of the weather. He then scaled the heights of the tower to help install his masterpiece at the top of the south west pinnacle.



Together with colleague Mark who has re-carved one of the huge and complex lower stones that had cracked as a result of corrosion of the Victorian rod that supported it, and Wiltshire Stonemasons boss Adrian – also a former St Laurence student – they will complete the installation of the intricately carved pinnacle – restoring it to its former glory.

Before hoisting the stones up to the top of the tower, Ethan and Mark were on hand at a BoA Youth drop



in attended by close to 100 people, where they were able to show people of all ages both the original and newly carved stones sitting side by side. They answered a wide range of questions from how they became stone masons to how they carved such complicated designs, and people of all ages took the opportunity to stroke the stones before they were hoisted aloft where they won't be touched hopefully for another 100 years.

The previous week Wiltshire Steeplejacks had been on hand to talk to young people about the life and work of the steeplejacks who have re-

pointed and repaired the spire.

Speaking to young people at the BoA Youth drop in Ethan said "It has been an amazing privilege to carve this special stone. Opportunities like this don't come along very often. And having this stone here at Christ Church - right next to my primary school - makes it extra special".

Becky Strike, Community Outreach Project Officer for this National Lottery Heritage Fund and Bradford on Avon Preservation Trust funded project commented: "We were absolutely thrilled to learn that a former student of both our local schools was carving this key feature of Christ Church, and that he was able to talk to people of all ages about his work at our 'Meet the Stonemasons' drop in last week'.

Rev Tessa Mann added " It is so special to see such talented traditional skills in action. The pinnacle marks the culmination of the restoration of Christ Church's landmark tower and spire and restart of its landmark clock.

This is not the end though – next we move onto new lighting and restoration of the interior of the church, so there will be many more opportunities for people to get involved". *Gillian Ellis-King, Discover Christ Church project coordinator*
