Dear Friends,

Recently Tessa and Zoe were in the school at Winsley asking some of the children what they hoped for in a new Rector. One child said, 'imagination' – isn't that a brilliant suggestion. Our imagination can be a wonderful and powerful resource for good. Imagination is a creative resource used by writers, composers, engineers, scientists, inventors, artists of all kinds and especially by children.

Children have a natural capacity for imagination as they create their games with one another or just by themselves. Have you ever been enthralled by watching a child play with their toys? They often talk to them as they create a wonderful imaginative scenario. Some children, when they feel unhappy, will use their imaginations to cheer themselves up.

Jesus told adults that 'unless they became as little children they could not enter the Kingdom of heaven.' I think that he saw in children the best qualities that so often get 'educated' out of children when they become adults. Would you agree that children are usually more naturally playful, tactile, forgiving, creative, trusting, inquisitive, imaginative with an enthusiasm for life than we adults?

Whilst the imagination can be used positively it can also be used negatively. It's worth reflecting how often we adults can worry about the smallest things, imagining the worst. When we realise how we can easily do this it may make us more aware of how powerful the imagination can be. Given the power of the imagination, we may want to think about how much and in what ways we can use it positively.

St Augustine of Hippo (354 AD -430 and St Ignatius of Loyola (1491 – 1556) are two spiritual giants of the Church and have inspired modern day spiritual writers to help us to use our imaginations in prayer and in study of the scriptures. Some people find it helpful to take a bible passage and imagine they are one of the characters in the story and then see how the story unfolds. Or take a passage of scripture and imagine the words are addressed to oneself directly and imagine one's response. The results can be amazing.

I wonder in what ways we would like our new Rector to be imaginative? Perhaps in exploring new ways of worshipping or of using our buildings or of how we can better serve our local communities and make Jesus known, or how we can become more like the children of God.

AN AFTERNOON AT THE COURT OF THE SUN KING

Sofia Pedro – soprano; **Xander Baker** – viola da gamba;

Sunday 6th August at 3pm

Winsley local Xander Baker and his friends and colleagues from the Conservatorium van Amsterdam will present an afternoon of royal music from the court of the Sun King, Louis XIV. This sublime music was written to delight and divert the denizens of the court of Versailles, but don't think that this music is somehow aloof or unfeeling; the subtle melodies, elegant dances and heart-wrenching harmonies convey the most human of emotions.

The programme will include two secular cantatas – dramatic pieces with texts drawn from classical mythology, discussing themes of love, grief, despair and bucolic ideals. One is by Louis-Nicolas Clérambault, and the other by Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre, one of the few known female composers of her time, and famed for her genius and creativity as a composer. An instrumental suite by the legendary viola da gamba player Marin Marais completes the programme, containing one of the most perfect passacailles ever written.

As a Winsley resident for most of his life, Xander is thrilled to be able to bring something of the music he loves back to where he began as a musician, along with some of his favourite colleagues from Amsterdam (not that any of them are actually Dutch!). The ensemble plays on period instruments, using materials and techniques used when the music was written, in order to find the sound-world that the composers would have had in mind.

Tickets cost £12/£9 for concessions (students and under 25), which will include tea and scones in the church hall after the concert, and a chance to chat to the musicians about the music and their instruments. Proceeds will be shared between St Nicholas Church and the musicians.
