Dear friends

What a year!

Who would have imagined life now as we celebrated Christmas last year and made our New Year resolutions? I don't know what yours were, but they often fall into categories such as keeping in touch with family and friends more, eating more healthily, drinking less alcohol and taking more exercise – actually going to the gym rather than just paying the direct debit each month.

And then 'lockdown occurred.' 'Lockdown' - a word we hardly ever used in everyday life, but we now use regularly, along with other words and phrases such as social distancing, Covid-19, track and trace, hands – face – space, facemask and so on.

And there we were, blessed with long spring days, with glorious sunshine and many of us, surprisingly, managed to keep our New Year's resolutions. We have managed to spend more time with family and friends, albeit on What'sApp, Zoom or Teams. Old friendships have been resurrected. We have mastered new IT skills in order to keep in touch.

When panic buying of food stuffs emptied shelves in our supermarkets, we were creative in the kitchen with what we had in our freezers and cupboards, experimenting with new recipes, and when flour was available, baking biscuits and cakes.

Many of us rediscovered the joy of gardening, growing our own vegetables, or like me, at least growing tomatoes. In our now quiet environment, no planes in the sky, little traffic on our roads, we rediscovered the joy of silence as we went out for our daily walk. We were amazed at the sheer number of birds we could hear singing; daily we watched nature blossom in our hedgerows, in our fields. We had time to stop and stare, to watch the new-born lambs gambolling. We delighted in meeting friends and strangers, albeit at a distance. There was a sense of camaraderie, clapping the NHS with our neighbours - we were all in this together, helping friends and neighbours access food and medicines; checking all was well.

But of course, it was not all good news. Hospitals were overwhelmed, staff trying to understand and treat this new virus. Daily on our news we watched hospitals becoming overwhelmed first in Italy, with people dving in corridors without the comfort of loved ones present. And then the virus spread....

It has been a very tough year for many. Coping with living alone during lockdown, worry about children's and grandchildren's education, fear of losing lives, livelihoods and homes. Many have lost loved ones and have not been able to be with them or have the funeral service they would have liked.

We are very fortunate living here, but we are constantly aware of the effect of this virus on those far less fortunate. As I write, different parts of the country are going into different Tiers and we still have the uncertainty about how we celebrate Christmas.

As Christians, especially during this time of Advent, we are called to see signs of hope, of light shining in the darkness, of God's presence around us. I wonder what signs of hope you have seen. The success of scientists' skills in creating a vaccine has to be a sign of hope we can all hold on to.

And locally? Our churches are now open as places of refuge, comfort and hope for all who venture in. There are Christmas tree exhibitions, nativity sets, crib scenes – all different ways of telling the Christmas story. Our churchyard Christmas trees, stars and decorations as well as activities show the world that Christ is still present, bringing people together, light out of darkness, signs of hope.

God doesn't call us to be heroes; he created us human. With all our vulnerability, frailty and failings, by the grace of God, we can each reach out, one human being to another, to bring comfort and joy, hope for the future to our neighbours, friends and family at Christmastime and throughout the coming year.



Let us hold one another in our thoughts and prayers this Christmas.

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Changes to Church House team

An update from David Pain, Diocesan Secretary.

The staff teams based at Church House in Salisbury (although working from home at present) have completed a restructure. Interviews for staff applying for newly defined roles are now complete and we are on course for an overall reduction of staff costs of 10%.

There are changes in individual roles in each of the four teams in which we work. Approximately half of the staff are now in a transition to newly defined roles in a process to be completed by January. In this context we are sad to be saying goodbye in coming weeks to four colleagues who have given long and dedicated service to the diocese: Ian Bromilow, Alison Comlay, John Kilbee and Jane Murrell.

In January we will publish a 'How can we help you' guide with details of the services provided by our four teams and the names of those who are now able to work with you to provide those services. Please don't hesitate to contact me with any questions in the meantime.

The four teams that serve the diocese are:

Mission, Ministry and Communications (MMC) which is refocusing resources to encourage mission and ministry across our communities and parishes to be locally led and centrally supported, in line with the Diocesan priorities for growth. This includes fostering a culture of vocation (lay and ordained) investing in ministerial formation, supporting a genuine localised strategy for mission (including discipleship and social justice) and developing the potential of our digital engagement.

The Parish Support, Governance and Administration Team provides first point of contact for those we serve, via parishsupport@salisbury.anglican.org. The team will act as a resource and information hub for our churches, clergy and their local communities to support, resource and enable good management and administration at every level of the diocesan structure. This includes the Church Buildings team which supports the work of the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) in advising and assisting parishes in their care for church buildings.

The Finance and Asset Management Team is responsible for all financial functions of the DBF with an annual expenditure budget of £14m. The team is responsible for the procurement and maintenance of all clergy property, recognising the importance of the home to clergy wellbeing and ability to provide ministry. Our Property Trading Company (SDBFBC) provides surveying services to schools and private clients, we are expanding this work to create more income. A newly established fundraising function will be financed by the national church to support giving across the diocese.

The People, Safeguarding and Learning Team seeks to ensure best practice is followed in safeguarding and in ensuring staff are looked after and able to fulfil their potential.

Soap Builds Hope

Bishop Andrew is suggesting you put soap at the top of this year's Christmas list, to save lives.



The humble bar of soap has morphed into a key tool in the global fight against coronavirus across the world this year, and Bishop Andrew is joining with Christian Aid to urge the public to put it at the top of their 2020 Christmas list.

The Bishop is encouraging us to buy the traditional Christmas gift of soap for the world's most vulnerable people, as well as for loved ones closer to home, to help save lives near and far.

3 billion people - 40% of the world's population - do not have access to soap and water in the home, making regular handwashing very difficult. In a bid to help some of the world's most vulnerable people protect themselves from the virus, Christian Aid has provided soap for almost 250,000 people worldwide since the outbreak began.

As lockdown forces many churches to explore digital worship and connection, Christian Aid this year has expanded its digital gift selection to include a Charity Gift enabling supporters to help train more women to make soap for £15 or help provide clean water for £30.

Bishop Andrew said:

"Across the UK and the world Covid-19 and measures to curb it have devastated lives and livelihoods, instilled fear and forced vulnerable people into more desperate poverty.

"But as we look to Christmas we turn our eyes to Jesus whose life, in a time of oppression and fear, introduced a hope that transformed the globe as it spread across it.

"We are reminded that God walks with us through deeply difficult times and works through us in all circumstances to show love to this world.

"Thankfully, we have tools such as soap and handwashing to help keep us safe and this year I would encourage people to reach out to our global brothers and sisters and put those tools in the hands of some of the world's most vulnerable people. Please do consider putting soap and water at the top of your Christmas list and together we can save lives and offer hope this Christmas."

Refugees living in crowded camps are particularly vulnerable to disease and since April 2020 Christian Aid partner organisations in Bangladesh have provided over 40,000 bars of soap for Rohingya families and the local host community.

In Ethiopia where coronavirus is an additional threat to lives on top of the climate crisis and the locust swarms of 2020, Christian Aid partners are training women to make soap from the drought resistant aloe vera plant. The soap not only protects the women's own families but provides a vital source of income.
